## EDUCATION

- In 2023, 35% of Arizona students (grades 1–8) were chronically absent, up from 13% in 2019. Currently, one in three students is regularly absent from the classroom, signaling a growing issue.

## WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

- It typically takes formerly incarcerated individuals at least six months to find a job after being released, and still large employment disparities for formerly incarcerated individuals exist due to immense hurdles, with national unemployment rates higher than 27%.

- The annual cost of childcare in AZ per year is: Arizona (infant \$14,040), \$12,662 (toddler), \$10,920 (4 year-old). This is 21-27% of the typical salary in Arizona.
